7. AIMS & OBJECTIVES

This course aims to introduce students to the diverse ways of defining modernity from a humanistic perspective and help them develop a critical awareness of our present human condition through a comprehensive view of the formation and the nature of the contemporary world. Emphasis will be placed on the various intellectual, social, philosophical, political, and cultural and technological developments that have transformed the modern world into the contemporary world. The course will integrate notions of modernity from science, politics, religion, philosophy and the arts.

8. COURSE CONTENT

The course will discuss the nature of the contemporary world, its origins, and the global impact of industrialization. It will then consider the related social, economic, and cultural developments in the modern world. Historical incidents as well as cultural texts like literature and film will illustrate these developments. Students will be introduced to the contemporary political and cultural situations in different parts of the world. Finally, students will reflect on the problems and challenges for humanity posed by the contemporary situation of the world. This course is cross-cultural and interdisciplinary.
