1	The course will start the discussion from sharing individual body stories and to initiate students' understanding of the issues from social and cultural perspectives.
2	Students will learn how to reflect on body issues from the philosophical and cultural dimensions through introduction of traditional and contemporary theories of the body in cross cultural discourses.
3	Students will be asked to examine bodily existence through representation of the body in art, gender making and commodity through in-class discussion.
4	Students will be directed to review problematic and ethical issues related to the body under the social context of everyday lives.
5	Students will work on course research assignment.
6	Students will reflect on the local situation and the social evaluation of the body in contemporary everyday environment through class discussion and course research assignments.

Tutorial Presentation	30%	1-6	Each student will participate in one presentation with clear individual assignment and division of labor. The presentation will test the student's ability to apprehend the phenomena of human body as discussed in the presentation readings and materials from the perspectives of philosophy, traditions, commodity culture, art and gender etc. The presentations will be assessed on its i) reading capacity, ii) clarity, iii) communication effectiveness, iv) relevance of materials used, v) time management and vi) critical impact.
Term Paper	30%	1-6	Students are requested to submit a term paper in an appropriate length at the end of the course. The topic should be relevant to the subjects of the course content in terms of the traditions and perspectives introduced. This is to assess their ability to analyze and discuss representing theoretical claims in body discourses in both traditional and contemporary domains as well as their applications to case studies.
Final Examination	40%	1-4, 6	The final examination will test the students' comprehension of the theories in philosophy, traditions, contemporary commodity culture, art and gender etc. introduced in the course in relation to human body and its various representations. The questions are designed to assess their ability to analyze and discuss these perspectives and theoretical claims and to apply them to cases suggested in the questions.

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
